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"Tool Box Talks" - Safety Tip

HEAT SURVIVAL

Hot day, hot job, high humidity and BINGO another heat victim. No one is immune, and construction workers are prime candidates for heat related illnesses. During hot weather stay alert for telltale symptoms and remember these first aid tips:

HEAT EXHAUSTION - Symptoms are heavy sweating, nausea, headache, weakness, vomiting, tiredness, fast pulse. First Aid - Move to a cooler area, cool by wetting towels and wiping down the forehead. Remove any wet or sweat soaked clothing. Fan the victim. Do not give any fluids to a victim unless fully conscious. Follow up with a medical checkup.

HEAT CRAMPS - Symptoms are severe muscle spasms in the back, stomach, arms and legs, usually caused by drinking large quantities of water without replacing salt during periods of heavy perspiration. First Aid - Move to a cooler area. Make sure that no water is given unless fully conscious. When you do give water make sure that the victim takes only slow small sips. Get medical attention as soon as possible.

HEAT STROKE - Symptoms are high temperature and dry skin, rapid breathing and pulse. Victims may appear disorganized and confused, with headache, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, seizures and the possibility of coma. First Aid - This is serious, so move fast to a cooler area and call an ambulance. Remove the outer clothing of the victim and apply cool water to the entire body. Fan the victim until professional medical help arrives.

To avoid heat illness, dress in cool clothing, wear your hard hat, don't over-exert your body during high temperature periods and get plenty of fluids. Remember that Heat related illnesses MUST have medical attention. If you are experiencing any of these heat related illnesses, going to the doctor will not affect your safety bonus, so go and get the medical attention you need. Heat illnesses should never be taken lightly.

Safety signs alert you to dangers and warnings - read them, understand them, obey them. They were posted for your benefit.

Robert Hooke By: Tom Frisby (Repent from 11/1/2008)

When you push down on something and it springs back, the bounce back is a function of the force of the push down. It is not the "law of elasticity" by Robert Hooke that fascinates me; rather that it was developed before computers. It is not that the Empire State Building was constructed in around 12 months, but that it was scheduled and constructed before computers and Prima Vera software systems. And Dmitri Mendeleyev said: "It is the function of science to discover the existence of the order of nature and causes governing this nature" and then went on to put together the periodic tables . . . without the benefit of a computer or even a calculator. And so for me it is not so much the wonderment of this discovery that fills me with awe, but that Mendeleyev used what the other great scientists (such as Einstein, Leonardo and Galileo) used, and that was their minds.

And as I hear about our educational process failing when we have more computers per classroom and student than any other country in the world, I wonder what we are teaching. How to think or how to use a keyboard? When I was in grade school, I was never taught the alphabet, but I was taught how to sound out words and their meaning. I was taught how to figure out what a story was all about, but not memorize dates and names. I still stumble over the alphabet and my rote memory is not red hot.

We read the Bible at the supper table and discussed what we read; and thereafter when I took English in college, figuring out what the dickens Shakespeare was talking about wasn't too difficult. I went through undergraduate and law school and never took an objective (true/false or multiple answers) test, but had to narrate my answer in a coherent, logical manner. All through school, my teachers challenged me, and taught me thereby to "think" about my response. I had only my wits, my Big Chief red tablet and a number two yellow pencil as my tools. So did my classmates.

I mention this for two reasons: the first is that I believe our educational system is not as horrible as the pundits would have us believe, but I believe it is deficient because it is not developing the most important resource we have — our minds. Our creative minds. The mind that enabled the caveman to figure out how to communicate through the use of the petroglyph, Leonardo to figure out how to make machinery and tools to improve productivity, Jefferson to figure out how to develop a system of government unlike any the world had ever seen and for Roosevelt to figure out how to beat the despot that would try to destroy that government.

And second, coming back to the industry I know and love . . . the construction industry . . . I too often see projects being "managed" by the computer, "scheduled" by the electronic software often so complex no one inside the company can truly use it and therefore must "outsource" the company's "thinking" to a scheduling consultant. In the case of the Empire State Building, that project might still be going on if the builder had relied exclusively on the computer. Instead, the partners got together and "used their heads" to figure out how to incorporate the steel and brick suppliers into the project, how to handle the traffic and material handling on the very narrow and busy streets of New York City. Like the new bridge in Charleston, the "team members" got together and continued to look ahead, figure out the best way to do things, to improve things. The operative terms were "got together" and "figure out".

They did what Hooke did, or Mendeleyev did. They used their heads. And on too many projects, I see General Contractors or Construction Managers who "tell" their subcontractors what to do, rather than to discuss the best and most productive way to do it. In Japan, there is a concept called "decision-thinking" by which the foreman and his crew plan out all new activities. I call it a "democratic dictatorship" there is input from the troops, but at the end there is the authoritarian who must direct and control. The concept of the three step quality program (P-I-F) is exactly that: the foreman, superintendent and owner's representative sit down before new activities, review the plans and specifications, material handling requirements, quality requirements and resources . . . before the crew begins the activity. This is what Leonardo would do: think about it, figure it out, try to come up with a better approach, make sure that everyone involved had ownership and accountability.

This is what the builders of the Empire State Building did. And the new bridge in Charleston.

A computer comes in handy. If we use our minds before we use the keyboard.
