Seven and a Half Cents By Tom Frisby, The Frisby Group

Usain Bolt

American Carl Lewis set the 100 meter record with a time of 9.82 seconds in the Seoul, Korea Olympics in 1982. In 2009, Usain Bolt broke his own record with a time of 9.58 seconds. Doesn't seem like much but consider this: if Carl Lewis had run his same race in the Korea Olympics, he would have come in second to Usain by a staggering 10 meters, or almost 40 feet. Just shaving off a fraction of a second had that impact on the outcome of the race.

In total quality management, one of the concepts is to continue to improve, to get a tad better over time. That is done by establishing goals, developing a game plan to meet the goals, measuring how you did and evaluating why you were either successful or fell short. Construction companies like M.A. Mortensen have practiced this approach for years with outstanding results. And such companies realize that if each workman just improved productivity by 10 minutes a day, it adds up. A ten person crew would improve productivity by 100 minutes a day or 500 minutes a week and over 2000 minutes a month. And if there are 10 crews . . . do the math.

It adds up. A great song in the Broadway Play Pajama Game was *Seven and a Half Cents*; you should listen to it on the web. The first stanza goes like this:

I figured it out
I figured it out
With pencil and a pad I figured it out!
Seven and a half cents doesn't buy a helluva lot,
Seven and a half cents doesn't mean a thing.
But Give it to me Every Hour
Forty Hours Every Week
That's enough for me to be living like a king.

And that is the way it works. Productivity is a function of planning. Planning the development and training of the people in the organization. Planning of the supply chain, including material handling. Planning to build in quality instead of inspect and correct. Planning for safety. Planning the steps necessary to achieve the goal, and then measuring to make sure you are meeting the goal and hopefully improving upon them. Shaving off a few minutes here and there, and who knows. In part this is what six sigma is all about – by eliminating waste (perhaps just one step in the material handling process, or reduce the failure rate from 5 in 1000 to 4 in 1000, or whatever), every time the process is repeated it will be at a tad less time and that adds up over time. Maybe that seven and a half cents will be enough for you to be living like a king. Less than a second of saving brought world fame and fortune to Usain Bolt.

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"Tool Box Talks" - Safety Tip

Measles

Measles is a highly contagious illness that primarily spreads via:

- Droplets or airborne particles from the noses, mouths, or throats of infected people.
- Contact with an infected person's respiratory secretions or saliva.
- Contact with surfaces contaminated with respiratory secretions or saliva.

Despite a great reduction in the number of cases and near eradication of the disease in the United States at the start of the 21st century, measles continues to occur domestically. Measles is usually a childhood disease but can affect individuals of any age. Outbreaks are most common in the winter and spring.

Initial symptoms, which usually appear 10–12 days after infection, include high fever, runny nose, red eyes, and white spots on the inside of the mouth. Several days later, a rash develops, starting on the face and upper neck and gradually spreading to the rest of the body. Measles is typically most contagious several days before the rash appears. In some cases, measles can lead to severe complications, including fatal pneumonia.

Workers may be exposed to measles whenever the virus is circulating in the community. Some workers also may be exposed to infected individuals who arrive in the U.S. from abroad. Workers who perform services or other activities in homes in affected communities also may be exposed. Workers who have not received the measles vaccine or who have not had the disease can get measles if they are exposed.

The measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccine can prevent measles. For the vast majority of recipients, the vaccine is safe and effective. As with almost any vaccine, however, a small number of recipients may experience allergic reactions, side effects, or other adverse events. The benefits of vaccination typically far outweigh these risks.

Oh, I stand corrected. We are *already* installing buildings like LEGO sets in record time, and robotics are already running our warehouses, drones are already circling jobsites and . . .

Someone said that excellence is a habit.

Some other habits which bear note:

- Mediocrity
- Not accepting accountability
- Blaming Other
- Being disrespectful
- Not reading
- Low profits

Excellence is the product of intentionality. Excellent companies are products of management's deliberate goal of becoming and staying excellent, and developing game plans which assure that goal is continuously attained. Excellent companies set high standards and strive at all levels to attain them. That is done by each member of the company developing habits of knowing the right thing to do, then doing it, and then figuring out how to do it better. An attitude we see in winners on sports fields or battle fields. So the habits themselves are intentionally undertaken: actions which produce successful companies and projects.

But someone else said that too often our problem is not that we set our goals too high and we fail to meet them, but we set them too low and we attain them. So we develop habits of mediocrity, of being average. "With this market, we are going to get more work than we can handle anyway, so why spend time and money developing personnel." "Well, we have always been able to negotiate our losses with that owner because we do good work, so updating schedules and maintaining documentation is really a waste of time." "Look, if I bid the specifications and performed in strict accordance with them, we would never get a job and we sure wouldn't make the money we are making now."

The habit which is inconsistent with superior performance is not what is done or not done. The habit is the attitude that one can get by without performing in a superior manner, an attitude that others are responsible for your problems and you never are, an attitude of adversarialness and not collaboration. The attitudes of managers and executives are infectious. So are the attitudes of supervisory personnel who may have greater impact on labor productivity than managers. The attitude of the lead craftsman, or foreman who consistently plans the work, insists on contract compliance and figures out how to do it better next time – that attitude is worth a ton of money to the contractor and unfortunately is seldom adequately recognized and rewarded.

Habits are the children of attitude.
